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Exploring Character Traits with the Center City Kids!

The purpose of this downloadable packet is to provide engaging activities to extend the learning of the Adventure Series read-aloud books. This Adventure Series Literacy Connection packet focuses specifically on developing a student's ability to understand and identify character traits of the Center City Kids, who are the main characters in the Adventure Series books. Each activity is unique and aligns with the Common Core State Standards for Literature for kindergarten through fourth grade. By completing the packet activities, students are reinforcing and practicing the following literacy skills:

- Reading comprehension
- Character analysis
- Text-to-self connection
- Critical thinking
- Vocabulary development

You can complete one activity or the entire packet. Review the Character Traits Activity Contents page to determine which activity is best for your child or student.



Character Traits

Character traits are often taught during literacy instruction using fictional texts like the Adventure Series.

What are they?

Character traits describe a character's personality. In essence, character traits tell us who the character is. These traits can be determined by the character's actions, behaviors, and emotions.

Why are they important?

Character traits are important to identify because they help students understand who a character is through their actions, words, emotions, and body language. This allows students to understand a character's motivation and analyze their actions within a story. Students can also make strong inferences (or informed guesses) based on their understanding of a character's personality or past actions.

Tips for helping your child or student practice this skill:

Stop and ask questions about the main character(s) when reading an Adventure Series read-aloud book, such as:

- How would you describe this character? What makes you think so?
- What do you think they meant when they said. . .?
- How did that make them feel? Why?
- Why did they do that? Explain.

Directions:

Cut out and glue each character on a popsicle/wooden stick to create puppets. Let your imagination shine. Use the puppets to act out stories from the Adventure Series books.

Directions:

Print out the cards. You can use the cards in a number of ways including:

- Encouraging students to trade the cards among their peers
- Shuffling the character cards and using them to play a guessing game
- Categorizing the character cards into different piles based on shared similarities or differences
- Printing out a card set for each student and allowing them to use them as a reference, a memory device, or a scaffold for character activity sheets

Before reading one of the Adventure Series books, review the character cards of the characters featured in the book. This will help your student build background information on the featured characters.




